Here are some shared understandings of 'ocean literacy' curated through our Living Glossary workshops with our community of practice. These can be used as starting points in your work and projects.

Ocean literacy is:

- 1) An understanding and appreciation of the ocean and how it is changing
- 2) How people understand, talk about, relate to and value the ocean. An ocean literacy needs to encompass a coastal orientation.
- 3) Understanding of water and our relationship to it
- 4) An understanding of your influence on the ocean and its influence on you. It is a societal outcome that recognises multiple dimensions including knowledge, emotions and access, and results in a society that values the ocean
- 5) Enough understanding of how the ocean works and its value to the global ecosystem to manage it sustainably

Etymology

Ocean stems from the **ancient Greek** $\Omega \kappa \epsilon \alpha v \delta \zeta$, referring to a vast river encircling the Earth and personified as a deity. It passed into **Latin** as $\bar{O}ceanus$, then into **Old French** and **Anglo-Norman** as occean in the 12th century, meaning a vast body of salt water.

Literacy - etymon: <u>literate</u> stems from the **Latin** *litterātus*, meaning marked with letters and later learned or cultured. It referred to someone well-versed in literature or culture. (Source: Oxford English Dictionary)
